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Winter Sleigh Ride

Christmas came early for the Eastside Heritage Center this year when Diana Schafer Ford gave us a lovely Christmas sleigh to use in our Magic Season displays.

The black sleigh with red velvet lining and gold trim was purchased at a local antique shop by Diana's mother, Violet Cort Schafer, in the 1960s. This child's wood and metal push sleigh dates to the later part of the 1800s and would have been used to push young children around in the snow, a kind of snowy day baby carriage. It could also be used by Victorian

children to take their favorite doll out for a stroll.

The sleigh was used every holiday season by the Schafer family to hold toys, gifts and decorations. In later years it was given to Diana, who also used it to display gifts. Her granddaughter Lauren's christening photo was even taken in the sleigh.

Diana also used to tow around her grandson, Kieran. She remembers the days when Kieran would fill the sleigh with toys, a crack whip and go for sleigh rides up and down their street in Renton.

Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition: Our Region's First World's Fair

2009 marks the Centennial of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition (A-Y-P), the first "World's Fair" of our region. Three million people, not only from the Pacific Northwest but around the world, attended the Exposition from June to October 1909, celebrating the Alaska Yukon gold rush and the growing trade market with Asia Pacific.

People from the east side of Lake Washington were able to take the ferry and enjoy the many educational and entertainment sites offered on the present location of the University of Washington.

A good resource for events, lectures, and history (www.aype.org) has been put together

by 4Culture, HistoryLink, MOHAI and others.

4Culture and HistoryLink have teamed up to create a curriculum about the A-Y-P and its impact on the Pacific Northwest.

Eastside Heritage Center was invited to work with a team of local heritage educators to design an interesting and relevant program for the students of Washington State.

The team has been meeting since September and has chosen a theme: Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition, the crowning jewel of this region's Klondike Gold Rush era, and Seattle's bid to enter the world scene as a portal to the Pacific.

The curriculum will include a PowerPoint presentation with the following essential questions: "How was the A-Y-P a reflection of life in the Pacific Northwest in 1909? How is the region different or the same today?"

The members of the team are also developing A-Y-P related projects to accompany the PowerPoint, with the entire curriculum available on-line by spring 2009.

The holiday season is a time when we gather with friends and family, honor past traditions and create cherished memories.

It is a time of year that speaks to the essence of the Eastside Heritage Center. EHC exists to preserve, share and interpret the stories from our community's past. Whether it's a collection of family photos with the Frederick & Nelson Santa year after year, or tales of ice skating on Lake Bellevue in the days when it used to freeze over, or stories of the mounds of snow that can fall in Hilltop and Sommerset at this time of year - deep within EHC's collection of photographs, archives and artifacts, are thousands of stories and holiday memories.

The other day we uncovered a wonderful childhood Christmas memory, written in the notebook of a 4th grader at Happy Valley School in 1911. Little Olga Carlson wrote:

"Last Christmas I had a surprise. The Christmas before I got a doll carriage from papa, and a doll from mama. The carriage had a blue cover

and the doll wasn't dressed. Then last Christmas they said to me that Santa Claus had written a letter to them and told them that I should go to bed at eight o'clock every night. I went to bed at eight every night.

While I was in bed they were dressing my doll all in pink, and putting a pink cover on my doll carriage. So I would not know it. They made bed clothes too. Then when they had it finished they put it away in one of the rooms, and would not let me go into that room till after Christmas.

Then Christmas came and we were going to see what Santa Claus had brought. My sister went right into that room [...] where the doll and carriage was. She brought it out for me to see it. I thought surely I had two dolls and two carriages, because I thought I had the blue one upstairs where I used to keep it. I said now I have two dolls and two carriages, then they all laughed at me. They had put all that I wanted from Santa Claus in the doll carriage too.

I got a cup and saucer from Ellen Johnson, a handkerchief from Amelia Johnson a necklace from Eric Johnson. A rocker from my sister Elsie. I gave away two writing boxes, one paint box, and one tie pin. I had a surprise Christmas."

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Lucile McDonald - A Lifetime of History

One cannot venture too far into Eastside history before encountering the name Lucile Saunders McDonald. This remarkable historian and journalist wrote hundreds of articles and authored or contributed to 34 books, including *The Lake Washington Story*, *Squak Slough*, and *Bellevue: Its First 100 Years*. During her extensive career, she worked as a journalist in Oregon, Argentina, New York, Alaska, and Istanbul before she settled in the Seattle area. Her longest post was at the *Seattle Times*, where she worked for 23 years before retiring in 1966.

She is perhaps most well-known for her contributions to local history. At the *Times*, she was the author of a popular series of articles on Pacific Northwest history in the Sunday magazine. After her "retirement," she continued to contribute articles to the *Times*, and in 1977 she took on a similar job with the *Journal-American* in Bellevue. She also wrote for *The Sea Chest*, *Columbia*, and the *Oregon Historical Quarterly*. Her last book to be published in her lifetime was *Making History: The People Who Shaped the San Juan Islands*, which appeared in 1990 when she was 92 years old. She passed away in 1992.

McDonald bequeathed her abiding love of history to her son Richard, who edited and published his mother's autobiography *A Foot in the Door* in 1995. A member of

many local historical societies, the younger McDonald wrote articles, led tours, and searched for "forgotten" coal mines. Richard also assembled a large repository of texts and articles on local history, many of which were donated to the Eastside Heritage Center after his death in 2003.

Lucile McDonald's work has also attracted the attention of other local historians. Lorraine McConaghy (currently at the Museum of History and Industry) collected a number of her articles and published them as *Lucile McDonald's Eastside Notebook* in 1993. A revised edition of McDonald's comprehensive text on Bellevue history, *Bellevue: Its First 100 Years*, was printed in 2000 with a new introduction by Charles LeWarne. These and other historians recognize the importance of McDonald's pioneering work in Eastside history. She laid a foundation of research and publication upon which scholars will build for many years to come.

COAL CREEK HISTORY PROGRAM

Coal mining was the Eastside's first major industry, producing millions of tons of coal to be shipped from Seattle to San Francisco at the turn of the 20th century. Join us for some adventuring into the past as we study the present.

The program will be led by researcher Stephen Grate, and begins with a 50-minute photo and geologic history presentation at the Lewis Creek Visitors Center, followed by a hike along the beautiful narrow and wooded trails of Coal Creek Park.

The presentation and hike explore the rich history of coal mining in King County. The Coal Creek mine was the world's largest in 1908, supporting a town of nearly 450 structures – hotels, stores, a theater, dance hall, and a professional baseball field. Today the town is gone and only some concrete remains along the trails to remind us of the industrial activity that took place at this site. The presentation uses historical photos to look at activities both above and below ground. The hike visits the major remains of a 'company town' that flourished from 1894 to 1934.

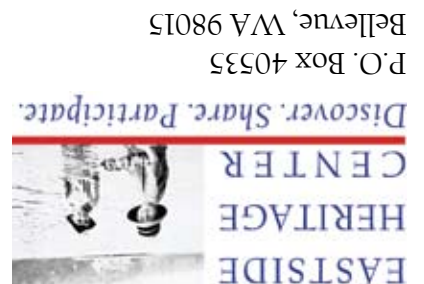
