History Comes Alive

On the night of February 4, three artifacts from Eastside Heritage Center's collection of more than 30,000 "came alive" at the Meydenbauer Center in Bellevue to tell their stories.

The 200 guests at EHC's annual Heritage Benefit Dinner heard Sherry Grindeland bring to life the Colman Diaries. Bellevue Mayor Don Davidson told the story of a fireman's jacket and David Schooler portrayed a needlepoint rendering of Bellevue's 1976 Land Use probability plan



created by Chris Towne Smith. Each began by stating their accession numbers and where they currently reside.

From the Winters House archives to Public Storage room #1325, Eastside Heritage Center faces the challenge

of how to make our collection accessible and real to the public. For the Heritage Benefit Dinner, we decided the best way to provide a glimpse at the variety and richness of the collection was to give a voice to three items, and let them share their story.

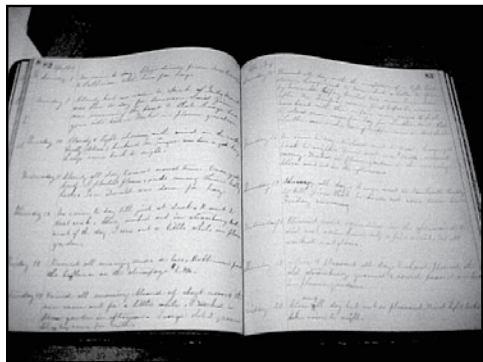
The memory of how we lived and grew as a community provides us not only with a map of the past, but also an optimistic blueprint for the future.

What is an "Apron Shower?"

While glancing through some old newspapers, EHC Archivist Megan Carlisle came across the following news item in the February 11, 1910 issue of *East Side News*, a precursor to the *East Side Journal*:

"Mrs. "Dick" Richardson was responsible for a very enjoyable event February 5 in the way of a birthday party for N. C. Carver, which took the form of an "apron shower." A little poetic effort expressed the sentiment of those present, as follows:

"Aprons, many, or aprons, few,
 May be showered this day on you.
 May you live to wear them out,
 Is the wish of all, no doubt.
 Some are white and some are blue,
 Maybe some of every hue.
 And each one says, in its own way,
 Many happy returns of the day."

Megan wonders: "What is an apron shower? Why were they held? Were they associated with a certain event like a wedding or moving into a new home?"

Eastside Heritage Center Volunteer Tom Hitzroth will guide a walking tour covering the history of Willowmoor Farm from the time of the first homesteader John Tosh through the ownership of James Clise, John Bratnober, Uberto Dickey and Walter Nettleton, who gave the property the current name of Marymoor, after his daughter Mary. The tour will visit the site of John Tosh's homestead, the original hunting lodge that James Clise built before the mansion, as well as the site of Mrs. Clise's greenhouses, the art gallery and the windmill. The tour will also discuss the Native Americans who occupied the property periodically from 6000 BC through the late 19th century.

In Memoriam

Marilyn Bomgren

Longtime Eastside resident, Marilyn Bomgren, passed away on February 6, 2010, following a two and a half year battle with cancer. Marilyn was born in Chicago on December 27, 1927, and moved to Bellevue with her husband, Charles, and three children in 1956. Charles and Marilyn lived in Bellevue for 35 years, before moving to Providence Point in Issaquah.

In the last few years of her life, Marilyn became interested in the history of the Bellevue Japanese American Clubhouse, the Kokaido. The Clubhouse had also been home to Bellevue's original Grace Lutheran Church, where her husband had served as pastor. A chance encounter with one of the members of the Kokaido, while strawberry picking, inspired Marilyn to delve further into the Clubhouse's history. Marilyn gave a memorable and informative presentation based on her research as part of EHC's Heritage Series in 2009.

Ira Owen Ostbo

Ira Ostbo died suddenly on November 27, 2009. Born to Norwegian immigrants on July 10, 1922, the family lived in Medina, Bellevue and Clyde Hill where they ran the King of Shrubs Nursery until 1979. Owen graduated from Bellevue High School as did his children and grandchildren. Owen served in the Army Air Corps 493rd Bomb Group during World War II, and spent 25 years with the Bellevue Fire Department.

Irvin Marr

Early Bellevue resident, Irvin Marr, died on January 26, 2010 at the age of 103. Born in Lowell, MA, on January 16, 1907, the family chose to "go west" to join friends who had settled in what is now Bellevue, when Irvin was just 9 months old. Irvin's father took up carpentry, and they bought a ranch on Bellevue's main thoroughfare (Bellevue Way) where, the Safeway Store later stood for many years.

Irvin graduated from Bellevue High School in 1926 and at the age of 17, by exaggerating his age, he joined the National Guard as a Buck Private.

Eastside Heritage Center is fortunate to have an oral history with Irvin, recounting his childhood memories of Bellevue in its early days.

Robert "Bob" Golliver

Robert Golliver passed away on Saturday February 20, 2010 at the age of 74. Born in Indiana, Bob received a degree in Engineering Law in 1960. In 1965 he was hired by Washington Natural Gas Company, later Washington Energy, where he became President and COO. Bob retired from Washington Energy in 1994 shortly before it merged with Puget Power to form Puget Sound Energy. Bob and his wife Joy were married for 54 years at the time of his passing and made their home in Bellevue (later moving to Queen Anne).

Norman & Esther Blye have been Winters House Hosts since the house first opened in the early 1990s. They were members of the Bellevue Historical Society since its beginning and have likely attended every program presented by both BHS and Eastside Heritage Center.

Norman's famous "Ferry Tales" programs started when Eloise Hennig, one of the first Program Chairpersons, asked Norm if he knew a lot about the Lake Washington ferries. He told her that his father had worked on the ferry Leschi and that his mother had run the concession stand, so he was practically born on the Lake Washington ferries. Norm, with Esther by his side, has given innumerable programs over the last 15 or so years, starting with BHS and subsequently to many other heritage organizations, including the Puget Sound Maritime Society.

The dynamic duo has also volunteered at nearly every Strawberry Festival since its revival in 1987, and Norm always recalls that he hulled strawberries at the very first Festival in 1925! Norm & Esther have recently retired from hosting the Winters House and are greatly missed.

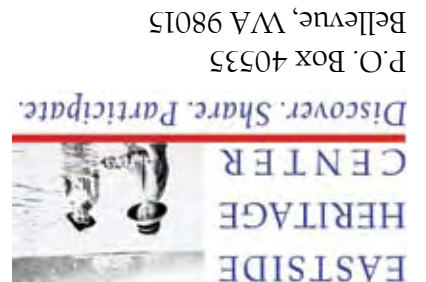
